Actions Speak Louder Than Words

"I'm not going to say a whole lot, but if you watch me you'll get the idea of what I'm about." This quote comes from Mark Kulinski, a 2011 graduate of Venango Catholic High School. Mark, a three sport athlete, gained much notoriety during the fall of 2010 when he set many District Ten passing records as quarterback for the Oil City Oilers. Through a cooperative agreement with the local public high school, Mark and other VCHS students have the opportunity to play sports not offered here at a competitive level. Soccer, track & field, tennis and swimming are the other co-op sports. Mark comes from a football family. His dad, Leon, was quarterback for the Oilers some years ago and his brother Matt also served as signal caller a few years ago. Mark also helped the Viking basketball team finish the 2010-2011 regular season with the best overall record in school history. His experience as a quarterback brought a leadership quality and a calming influence that was much needed, especially as the pressure mounted on a bunch of young players attempting to run the table without a loss. Mark's final sport was track & field. Aside from participating in the 1,600 meter relay and triple jump, he set the Oil City High School Pole Vault record in one of the final dual meets of the season. An Oiler...and also a Viking.

Mark has enjoyed his time here at VC. He's happy and peaceful. He truly loves athletics but has just as much fun playing ping-pong with his classmates at lunchtime. He's a straight A student who wants to be

challenged to be better. Mark earned the honor of being class Valedictorian. In his graduation speech, he challenged his classmates to settle for nothing but doing their best in everything they attempt in life. Headmaster Fr. John P. Malthaner recalls a conversation with Mark about the number of college recruits that were coming to Venango Catholic High School to speak to Mark. Asked if he was overwhelmed by the onslaught of college coaches who were lining up to speak to him, Mark simply said, "No, they've go a job to do. It's flattering, really. I have an idea where I'm going but they took the time to come over so I'll listen to them." Another conversation Malthaner recalls revolved around playing football in college. Asked if football was a priority, Mark replied, "Yes and no. Yes, because I would like to play at that level. But my first priority is to go to college and pursue a career in dentistry. If football works out, fine. If it doesn't, that's fine, too." Many times Fr. Malthaner and others made the remark as to how much Mark impressed them as a person.

Actions do speak louder than words. Most of us will remember what a person *did* more than what they *said*. Having the pleasure of being around him for four years at VCHS, we 'get the idea of what he's about'. Setting the records aside, we will remember Mark Kulinski as a good young man who is blessed with many gifts, maybe especially with a loving and supportive family, his own and the one here at school as well.



Mark graduated Valedictorian of the 2011 class and is currently at Case Western Reserve University majoring in biology and a member of the football team.

VC graduate finds she has mission in life

Megan Lutz of Oil City, an outstanding runner and a state qualifier for Venango Catholic High School and Oil City High School, was profiled in August in the John Carroll University newsletter as a scholar-athlete.

Lutz, daughter of Deb Lutz of Oil City, is a senior at John Carroll where she has earned honorable mention in the Academic All-Ohio Athletic Conference, as a member of the women's cross country and track teams for two consecutive years.

Oil City, Pa., is a stone's throw from Franklin and a quick jaunt down the road from Titusville.

It is also 1,000 miles from Ecuador.

Megan Lutz felt every bit of that distance when she sat aboard a plane heading toward that South American country in late May 2010.

"That was my moment of panic," said Lutz as she recounted her first campus ministry immersion experience at John Carroll. "I was thinking, 'what am I doing here?'"

The girl from a small city halfway between Pittsburgh and Erie, whose graduating class from Venango Catholic High School tallied 27 seniors, and whose fluency in Spanish was beginner level at best, was about to face the challenge of her life.

Just another day in the life of Megan Lutz.

Hailing from a town of just over 10,000 inhabitants, Lutz was and still is proud of her one and only home-

town.

"When I go for my run, I will always see someone I know," Lutz said. "Almost every face is a familiar one, which can be both good and bad. I love seeing them, but it extends the workout because inevitably I'll stop to talk."

It is a place she would love to come back to after graduation, but there was a definite pull to see the world first.

When it came time to seek out a college, she aimed big, targeting the likes of Notre Dame and Villanova.

Then her mother stumbled upon John Carroll.

"It might be a cliché, but when I first stepped on campus for a visit, I fell in love with the place," she said. "The people, the size, the academics ... it just felt like where I needed to be."

It also happened to be a good fit for her athletic career. A cross country runner from a high school program that was coached by the local pastor, Lutz and her small-in-number team had often competed against much bigger schools on a consistent basis. There would be no intimidation factor running at John Carroll.

"My mother was right," Lutz said with a laugh. "I really love competing and being on this team. I never would have had that opportunity at a bigger school like the ones I had initially applied to. Being a part of cross country has really been a positive experi-

ence in so many ways."

Lutz is now a senior and entering the second year of being a team captain. Based on the athletes returning as well as a strong freshman class, she feels very optimistic about the team she will be leading.

...When the competitive season ends, Lutz will turn to her life's pursuit of becoming a teacher. She has already done observations and will spend one day per week in the fall in a classroom. She will then spend the spring semester completing her student teaching requirements before picking up her diploma.

As an education major with a 3.97 grade point average, Lutz admits to be chomping at the bit to start her career.

"I love how education is the one major where you get a practice year before getting started on your own," she said.

All the while that Lutz has balanced academics and athletics, she has found time to give back in which ever community she can offer her benevolence. At first, it was in Oil City where Venango Catholic required its students to volunteer 25 hours of community service each year. She would teach religious education or get involved in downtown beautification projects.

Then, at John Carroll, she was encouraged to look into what campus ministry had to offer during Sunday Masses and followed through by

joining the Christian Life Communities and signing up for immersion experiences. That eventually put her on the plane to Ecuador.

... Fueled by that first trip, Lutz has since gone to Jamaica and will be heading down to New Orleans in January.

Lutz admits her life is "meticulously planned," and credits her absolute dependency on "to-do lists" a key to her sanity as well as her success.

At the same time, it is the unexpected moments that nourish her spirit.

"...I remember standing there (on top of a high hill in Ecuador) and just being in awe," Lutz said. "This feeling came over me that is hard to describe, but it was just a sense that despite all the challenges I encountered, this is where I was meant to be at this place and time."

Maxx Rynd takes his talents to Slippery Rock University

The 2011 basketball season was a perfect season. The boys finished 23-0. They were the KSAC Champions. Maxx Rynd, their spirited vocal leader, finished the season as the VCHS All-Time Leading Scorer with 1,749 points, passing a record that has stood since 1981 set by Mary Kay Lynch.

Maxx has decided to continue his basketball career at Division II Slippery Rock University.

Maxx was a three-time scoring leader in District 9. He earned the Rookie of the Year title in 2008-2009, 1st team KSAC All

-Star selection 2008-2009, 2009-2010, KSAC MVP in the 2010-2011 season.

This past season, Maxx averaged 25.4 points per game and 12.2 rebounds. He also averaged 6.8 assists and 3.3 steals.

"It is where I wanted to go for the most part," Rynd said of Slippery Rock. "Their point guard just graduated this year, so I might see some time. Their coach, Kevin Reynolds, is really nice. The conference is pretty good and I want good competition."

Maxx was also considering Robert Morris University.

"I was going to walk-on at Robert Morris, but I signed too late and I didn't want to walk on with another point guard already signed," he said. "I didn't know what I wanted to do yet and they didn't have my major, sports management."

Rynd will be a preferred walk-on and said he will get a scholarship, in all likelihood, his sophomore season.

NEW TECHNOLOGY IN THE COMPUTER LAB

Dedicated Video Conferencing Equipment.

In September VC saw the pinnacle component of the Diocesan's Wide Area Network (WAN) installed. The new video conference system is an educational tool providing dedicated high definition audio and video connectivity via a Scopia HD PTZ (pan, tilt, zoom) controllable camera/video server and a Samsung 55" HDTV LCD display all on a mobile cart. The system has already been successfully tested and utilized on two occasions. Students in Math and English classes recently participated in cooperative and interactive video conferencing. Ms. Hoeft's math students studying Economics had an entertaining customized tour via an educational liaison at the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame focusing on statistics and economics of sporting activities throughout the history of baseball. Work materials and study guides were downloaded in preparation for the live program. Mrs. Eckert's writing class took part in "The Deadliest Writing" collaborative writing project. It was a live interaction with the author and several writing classes from other distant high schools. The ability for VC to provide interactive audio and video capabilities is not limited to student use. The faculty will be using the device and others like it for staff training and to offer distance learning from within the circle of expertise of the VC faculty. We can now, via various faculty fortes, provide training and lectures to remote classrooms. The school's foreign language teacher, Mrs. Julie McCandless, will soon be teaching remote classes to schools that do not have a Spanish teacher on staff. Ultimately the library will be transformed into a media center where distance learning activity space and equipment will be utilized. The WAN equipment was provided through a Grant from the Education Dept. of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Erie and set up with the cooperation of IU5 in Edinboro. Both were instrumental in the establishment of the WAN for end uses such as the video conferencing capabilities and Internet2.



Venango Catholic's golf team could have opened the 2011 season better, but not much worse.

Coach Jim Hawkins' Vikings didn't compete in the season-opening Keystone Shortway Athletic Conference megamatch. Instead, in a last-minute decision, they played in the Warren Invitational at Blueberry Hill Golf Club, where they finished 12th in a 21-team field.

VC then traveled to Clarion Oaks Golf Club for its first KSAC match and began the dual-meet season with a 234-242 loss to Clarion.

Suddenly, VC was sitting at the bottom of the conference standing with an 0-1 record after having lost only two matches the previous season.

Venango Catholic, the third smallest of the 546 schools which sponsor boys golf in PA, also had a setback prior to the campaign. Senior Ben Guth, projected as the team's No. 3 golfer, injured his knee during the summer and was lost for the season.

Little did Hawkins and the Vikings know they would have to win all their remaining matches to win their first outright golf conference championship in school history.

It's quite possible it was better the young squad didn't know.

"After our first loss, with two freshmen and a second-year golfer, we improved and gained more confidence," Hawkins said. "The seniors - captain Garrett Hawkins and Matt Kuhn - helped them along."

Venango Catholic began its 9-0 run with a 225-242 win over Cranberry at Cross Creek Resort, the Vikings' home course. A 231-242 victory over returning KSAC runner-up Forest Area followed and the Vikes were 2-1 and on their way.

VC improved to 3-1 with a 217-267 victory over Moniteau at Shamrock Golf Course before winning its closest dual meet of the season with a 236-239 triumph over visiting Karns City.

Next up was a trip to Pinecrest golf course and a 237-250 win over Clarion-Limestone before the Vikings claimed the KSAC's in-season megamatch at Cross Creek Resort. Kuhn led VC with a score of 78

and Alec Thureau, also a senior, had an 80 and Garrett Hawkins' 82 gave the Vikings three golfers among the top six.

VC used its momentum to post a 219-227 win over defending conference champion A-C Valley.

Poised at 6-1 with three matches remaining. VC dispatched Redbank Valley (166-205) and Union (221-263) to set up its last-match heroics against visiting Keystone.

Thureau took home medalist honors with a 39. Hawkins, who didn't lose a match all season as the No. 1 player, settled for a tie in the final with a round of 42 en route to helping the Vikes to a 219-237 victory over the Panthers. Cranberry handed Clarion its second loss of the season at Wanango Golf Club and the title was Venango Catholic's!

Joining the three seniors on the team were sophomore Jonah Jones and freshmen Nathan Dudzic and Scott Toy - champions all.

VCCHS Receives Favorable Recommendation for Re-accreditation

Venango Catholic High School recently received a favorable recommendation for re-accreditation by the Pennsylvania Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools.

VC chose the Accreditation for Growth protocol as the basis of its study. This protocol calls for the school to evaluate its overall program, indicating areas of strength and also areas where growth is needed. There are twelve standards that need to be met (including areas such as Philosophy/Mission, School Improvement Planning, Finances, Facilities, Health and Safety, and the Educational Program) as well as several “action plans” that need to be recommended and implemented. VCCHS began the self-study about a year and a half ago. As Headmaster, I can honestly say we are grateful to have gone through this process. It’s good to make time and take a critical look at what you are doing as a school community. Being able to come together and name your strengths as well as recognizing areas that need improvement only serves to help us grow. We have set reasonable and necessary goals for the future of Venango Catholic High School. We believe these goals will help the school continue to provide a quality Catholic-Christian education to insure that our students are well prepared for the next step in their lives.

A big thanks goes out to the Validation Team that spent three and a half days with us at the school. The Validation Team consisted of four Catholic-Christian high school educators: two from the Pittsburgh Diocese, one from the Greensburg Diocese, and one from the Buffalo, NY Diocese. Each of the team members spent time with administration, faculty, students, parents, and staff members. Their role was to validate our self-evaluation and, specifically, to determine if we met the standards and objectives as outlined in the Accreditation for Growth protocol. They helped to affirm us in our areas of strength as well as challenge us in areas where growth is needed.

Venango Catholic High School looks forward to the next step: developing a strategy to implement the goals and objectives that will help us to better serve our most precious commodity...the students who walk through our doors each day!

Academic Team is off to a Great Start

The VC Academic Team (including math team) is off and running at full speed this year. Since school began they’ve been preparing for three different events. November 3rd found the math team competing at Clarion University in their 27th Annual High School Mathematics Competition. After a two hour test with 25 teams consisting of at least 200 students, the VC math team took 3rd place in their division! Senior Jake Smith took 4th place individually over approximately 130 other students. Congrats to the math team!

Since the math competition, the team has focused its sights on the KDKA Hometown High-Q (see separate article) and the Carnegie Science Center’s Chain Reaction Contraption Contest. The chain

reaction contest involves building a machine within specific dimensions that will perform a certain operation with 20 or more steps. This is a contest very similar to the famed Rube Goldberg competitions that test engineering, physics, and math principles. This year’s challenge is to play a musical instrument. The team has enlisted the help of Mr. Doug Suhr as their engineering mentor, and has also consulted with our music director Mr. Chad Hill. The actual competition takes place at the science center in Pittsburgh on December 9.

The academic team meets during lunch, activity period, and after school as needed, and is coached by Ms. Nancy Hoeft. Members include:
